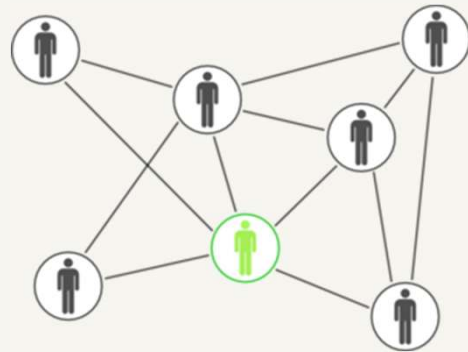

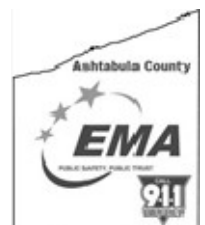

On February 25, 2025, the Ashtabula County Emergency Management Agency (ACEMA) convened a steering committee to begin the formal update to the county's hazard mitigation plan, last adopted in 2019. The meeting was held at the ACEMA's office in Jefferson, and it began promptly at 1:00 p.m. (lasting approximately 60 minutes).

Following a welcome message from ACEMA Director Mike Fitchet, the county's consultant (Doug Britvec with JH Consulting, LLC) provided an overview of the hazard mitigation planning process, including the role of steering committee members as well as OEMA and FEMA requirements. During the overview, the committee discussed the plan scope as well as participating jurisdictions.

- Regarding scope, the committee decided to focus on natural hazards, though not exclude the consideration of primary technological and human-caused hazards. (See the discussion regarding hazards below.)

The discussion about the hazards to include in this update was robust. The committee discussed the number of occurrences of each hazard, any mitigation projects that have been completed regarding each hazard, and whether the frequency and severity of each hazard has increased or decreased over the past five years. Generally, the steering committee elected to keep the hazards that appeared in the previous version and added three new hazards bringing the total hazards included in this plan update to 15 (see below).

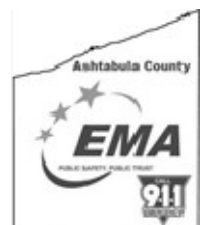

Director Fitchet noted that coastal erosion has become much worse over the past five years especially in and around Geneva-on-the-Lake and North Kingsville. Several committee members indicated that tornados and wildfires have become more frequent and more intense over the past 10 years. Committee members noted that cyber incidents are quickly becoming priority concerns amongst local government entities, businesses, medical facilities, schools, etc. These entities work on plans and other protective measures regularly. As a result, attacks are more and more sophisticated. Committee members agreed and asked the consultant to add cyber incidents as a hazard to be considered in this plan update. Following discussions amongst committee members the “Utility Failure” hazard will be a stand-alone hazard and should focus on dry day failures (i.e., non-storm related outages). Several Forest Management Plans have been updated to include the mitigation of invasive species, the most recent to cause issues in Ashtabula County is the Hemlock woolly adelgid.

Doug introduced ideas for an outreach plan before adjourning the meeting. The public must have the opportunity to participate, both during plan development and when a draft is available. Doug suggested using online surveys for input as the plan is developed and public meetings to offer draft reviews. Drawing on updated FEMA guidelines, Doug explained that the steering committee will need to identify “under-represented populations” in the county and devise an outreach strategy for them. Doug also explained that dam regulators and owners will need to have the opportunity to participate.

The committee also discussed other plans (i.e., zoning ordinances, floodplain regulations, comprehensive plans, etc.) that jurisdictions may have that can be integrated into the mitigation plans update.



The committee also reviewed the goals of the existing mitigation plan. Each goal was discussed and the committee agreed to leave the goals as they appear in the existing plan, and possible revisit as objectives and SMART projects are developed.

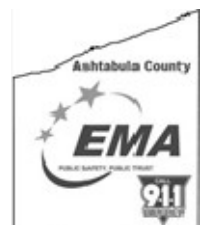
The committee was given a homework assignment to review the existing asset inventory list and make necessary changes to the list (i.e., remove assets that no longer exist, and add new assets that have been built since the last update). Following an opportunity for general questions and answers, the meeting adjourned at 2:15 p.m.

All Hazards

Existing Mitigation Projects – 3 ongoing

- Undertake periodic public awareness campaigns to educate the public on the benefits of mitigation and preparedness, as well as how to respond appropriately to myriad hazards.
- Identify existing sites that could serve as emergency shelters throughout Ashtabula County.
- Encourage residents, critical facilities, etc. throughout Ashtabula County to sign-up for wireless emergency alerts disseminated by the Ashtabula County EMA.

Coastal Erosion

Existing Mitigation Projects – 2 ongoing

- Pursue funding sources/partnerships to strategically place groins, break walls, revetment structures, riparian buffers, and other appropriate structures to slow erosion.
- Pursue funding sources/partnerships to place revetment structures in the beach profile or along the base of bluffs to absorb the energy of incoming waves and reduce erosion.

Cyber Incident (New)

- A cyber-attack targets an organization's use of cyberspace for the purpose of disrupting, disabling, destroying or controlling their computing infrastructure
- Cyber incident impacts can range from insignificant to catastrophic.
- Recent cyber incidents include Ashtabula County Medical Center, City of Geneva governmental system, Cott System (Recorder)

Sample Mitigation Projects

- Conduct a gap analysis to identify and prioritize cyber security needs across county owned critical assets.
- Increase cyber security training opportunities for county employees
- Distribute educational material in print and via social media regarding cyber security measures.
- Work with County IT to increase notification and warning capability regarding cyber threats.

Dam & Levee Failure

Existing Mitigation Projects – 2 ongoing

- Collect updated emergency action plans (EAPs) for Class I/II structures and create a GIS layer of inundation areas that appear in EAPs. Include downstream structures in the layer to support calculation of loss estimates.
- Rehabilitate high-hazard potential dams when those pose unacceptable risks to the public (to address those risks). Rehabilitation activities can include rehabilitation or removal of the structure, engineering activities, land use solutions, etc. County and state agencies should support these projects as appropriate by providing risk and other data as it is available.

Drought

Existing Mitigation Projects – 0 ongoing

Sample New

- Develop water storage plans, water use ordinances, contingency plans, and water delivery systems in water utility operating plans.
- Development of interconnects among water utilities.
- Encourage farmers to purchase crop and drought insurance.

11

Earthquake

Existing Mitigation Projects – 0 ongoing

Sample New

- Use outreach to foster earthquake awareness and mitigation in homes, schools, and businesses.

12

Flooding

Existing Mitigation Projects – 3 ongoing

- Undertake stream restoration projects; clean or dredge creeks and streams, clearing log jams, trees, shrubs, and sediment bars.
- Consider installing, re-routing, or increasing the capacity of existing storm drainage systems, which may involve detention and retention ponds. Seek funding to identify, map, and maintain existing critical culverts and storm drainage ditches near residential areas, roadways and low-lying areas throughout the county. Consider sewer infiltrations and inflow projects.
- Consider traditional flood mitigation projects such as acquisition and relocation, elevation, etc. of flood-prone properties.

Hazardous Materials Release

Existing Mitigation Projects – 1 ongoing

- Assess the feasibility of conducting a commodity flow study.

14

Health Related Emergency

- A public health emergency is any adverse event (natural or human-caused) that compromises the health of the population and has the potential to cause widespread illness.

Sample Mitigation Projects

- Undertake a periodic all hazard outreach program with all participating jurisdictions to provide information on public health emergencies.
- Identify additional addiction recovery/sheltering centers and increase recovery capability.
- Increase broadband capabilities to bolster telehealth.
- Increase opioid recovery resources and prevention programs.

Invasive Species (New)

Sample Projects

- Implement an invasive species education program to include hazards, identification, behavior, and quarantine procedures.
- Distribute information explaining the importance of not importing or exporting firewood.
- Work with agricultural producers to monitor and minimize nutrient runoff to prevent Algal Blooms.
- Distribute public education regarding property owner's responsibility to remove dead/dying vegetation affected by invasive species.
- Increase protection efforts for public infrastructure affected by dead/dying vegetation due to invasive species.

Severe Thunderstorm

Existing Mitigation Projects – 1 ongoing

- Develop a tree maintenance program for trimming and pruning trees to help prevent damage from falling limbs.
- Maintain StormReady certification. (Possible New)

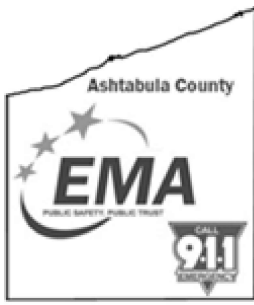

4.4.2. Ranking Results

Using the methodology described in Section 4.4.1, *Table 84 – Risk Factor Assessment* lists the risk factor calculated for each of potential thirty hazards identified in the 2025 HMP. Hazards identified as *high* risk have risk factors greater than 2.5. Risk factors ranging from 2.0 to 2.4 were deemed *moderate* risk hazards. Hazards with risk factors 1.9 and less are considered *low* risk.

Based on these results, there are twenty high risk hazards, seven moderate risk hazards, and two low risk hazards in Crawford County. Mitigation actions were developed for all high, moderate, and low risk hazards (see section 6.4). The threat posed to life and property for moderate and high-risk hazards is considered significant enough to warrant the need for establishing hazard-specific mitigation actions. Mitigation actions related to future public outreach and emergency service activities are identified to address low risk hazard events.

A risk assessment result for the entire county does not mean that each municipality is at the same amount of risk to each hazard. *Table 85 – Countywide Risk Factor Assessment* shows the different municipalities in Crawford County and what their risk factor assessment scores are. This table was developed by the consultant based on the findings in the hazard profiles located in sections 4.3.1 through 4.3.26.

Update given on dam project

ROAMING SHORES - Village Administrator Mark Reed II gave an update on projects within the village during the Roaming Shores Village Council meeting on July 1.

Reed said he is still trying to get a hold of Morgan Hose Fire Department about the controlled burn at the dam so that the Village can start the engineering analysis for that project.

The Village has \$58,500 in grant funding on hold, with a \$31,500 match, for a dam project. The grant is through the Rehabilitation of High Hazard Potential Dams (HHPD) program.

DLZ will be taking over administration and implementation of this grant.

ODNR has been working with FEMA to move their HHPD grants along. ODNR reports as of March 14, 2025, they are not sure if the Village will receive the funds yet due to government halts, according to Reed's report.

Councilwoman Sally Fell asked at what point will they know if those funds aren't coming.

"I'm not sure. I'll continue reaching out to them," Reed said.

Mayor Jennie D'Amicone said keeping it in his report keeps it in their thought process.

"We haven't been told with 100-percent certainty that it's a no-go," D'Amicone said.

Another update came during the July 15th meeting,

The Village Administrator has recommended and the Village Council has determined the need to modify the language regarding appellate rights located in Ordinance 388-08-03 which established water and sewer service charges, debt services for the same and collection of the same.

Section V. Right of Appeal under Ordinance 388-08-03 and under the Codified Ordinances is amended to read as follows:

"Section V. RIGHT OF APPEAL

All customers have the right to appeal bills rendered for water and sewer service charges. In the event that a billing dispute cannot be resolved by the utility billing department that initially rendered the bill it shall become the responsibility of the Village Administrator to resolve such dispute. If the customer is still unsatisfied, the village Administrator will send a certified letter to the customer asking them to attend a hearing with the Utility Study Committee. The appeal must allow the customer to accept or deny a hearing; customer refusal to the scheduled hearing waives their right to settle there claim.

There will be a fee in the amount of \$100 for the hearing to be scheduled to be paid by the requesting party. Failure to appear will forfeit the associated fee. Any requester who goes through the hearing will accept the ruling of the Committee.

Also at the meeting, Council waived the three-reading rule and passed an ordinance dissolving the "Human Resources Committee."

It initially was on the agenda as a first reading.

Councilwoman Sally Fell asked why they were spending time on the ordinance when the committee would fall off in six months anyway if they don't do anything with it.

Solicitor Christopher Newcomb suggested they could pass it as an emergency if they wanted to clear it from the table now.

Council voted to waive the three-reading rule. Fell voted against passing it. Councilman Steve Kaufman abstained.

Fell asked why the committee needed to be dissolved, since there are some important human resource matters to be resolved in the village.

Councilwoman Holly Mayernick said council could discuss the matters instead in a work session.

She and other council members also felt the administrators are tasked with those matters.

Council also waived the three-reading rule and passed an ordinance creating a construction bond fund as a custodial fund for the collection of monies received and associated with certain construction and improvement bond and/or levy monies received by the Village required to be held for such purposes.
